December's Spotlight Award Winner Kid's Inclusion Award

Kirksville's middle school students of William Matthew Middle School Special Education instructor Jacinda Rhoads who are working with Team Rhoadsters Café have been selected as the Adair County SB40 December Spotlight Award recipients. This class of nine students has been nominated in recognition of

their contribution to Kids Inclusion in our community.

Mrs. Rhoad's students were nominated for this award by middle school teacher and coach Laurie Waddle. "Jacinda and her Team Rhoadsters have opened up and successfully run a Cafe' at WMMS for the staff and employees to purchase a beverage or snack from their unique menus," Waddle said, "This started last year and it continues this year as well. I am a faithful customer. I thoroughly enjoy the student's professionalism, the creative snacks and being served in my classroom. It truly is a pick me up experience at the end of the day, at the end of the week."

In November their menu included Blessing Trail mix, multiple flavors of hot coffee, hot tea, hot cocoa and hot apple cider. The Café is usually held on Fridays and typically comes with a seasonal theme. The program, which was developed by their teacher Jacinda Rhoads, also teaches the students how to run a business, improve math and money skills, provide quality customer service, and increase their general life skills necessary to succeed in the adult world of work.

"The opportunity created for these students to fully participate in their education and to provide a valued service to the staff of the middle school is what inclusion is all about," said Crystal Aminirad, Executive Director of Adair County SB40. "It's more than a job and it's more than learning life



skills. These students are recognizing that they do provide meaningful contributions to their community. Their customers are supporting the development of lifelong connections which will assure inclusive employment options as they transition into adulthood. We admire Mrs. Rhoads' innovative approach and the student's strong work ethic!"

In receiving this award Mrs. Rhoads said "Team Rhoadsters students are honored to be recognized for the month of December! What a wonderful surprise. Tears of joy come to me as I think of how our Cafe got started and how far we have come to be the 'famous Friday café' for our teachers and staff not only at WMMS but also the whole district. Crystal's Corner

Welcome to 2024! It's that time of year AGAIN where we all make New Year Resolutions - maybe to manage personal finances better or improve our physical or mental health. Goal setting is a great idea for everyone to consider, but the self-discipline it takes to reach our goals is often not so easy to stick to. Most people find that life is best lived when we <u>find the right balance</u>, making sure that all areas of our life are included in our personal improvement efforts.

Professionals who are providing services to individuals with developmental disabilities (like our SB40 Service Coordinators) challenge themselves to provide *person-centered planning* services. They work with folks to develop annual life plans which sometimes look very similar to resolution setting. In the person-centered planning process, the planning team identifies each individual's strengths, goals, medical needs, service needs and desired outcomes.

Often that planning process can fall into either a 'medical model' of services or the 'social model' of service. Planning teams sometimes debate about which model is the best approach to meet the needs of individuals we are serving.

The medical model focus is to try to find remedy to the challenges thought to be caused by disability through a medically focused assessment, such as development of a health care plan, finding appropriate medications, therapies and adaptive equipment. Often, clinicians on the planning team want to see the medical model approach used to provide health care to 'fix' a health issue, or to at least bring an individual into the realm of 'normal health' as much as possible.

Human services professionals on the planning team tend to lean into the social model, which holds the view that challenges presented are rooted in how the individual and their society interact with each other. These planners look at community-based barriers, such as accessibility, accommodation, relationships, etc. One example of a social model solution might be building a ramp for better access (recognizing that the building's stairs are the problem, not the individual). Another example would be using assistive technology as an accommodation in order to have an integrated job. Social model approaches are the foundation of home and community-based services, relational supports, inclusive education, networking, integrated employment and trauma informed approaches.

So which approach is better?

At Adair County SB40, our Case Management and Learning Center programs are based upon our vision that the best approach is <u>finding the right balance</u> – one that fits each individual that we serve *like a glove!* Of course, it's critical to provide a plan that includes good safety and security measures through a trusted health risk safety plan. But it is also very important to assure that everyone lives 'their best life' through access to their community, their friends and family, to attend church if they want, work in the job that they want and participate in events and recreation that they want. We know that a good balanced approach to life planning makes for the best and healthiest life for everyone.

This is why Adair SB40 works so hard to collaborate with service providers, schools, community agencies, civic leadership, area healthcare clinics, hospitals, transportation services, employers and others. We want to assure that our work links people with disabilities and their families to all of the resources available and which they can benefit from. We look forward to working with you in 2024. Together, we can make *magical things* happen!
